Dear Sir,

I beg to acknowledge yours of Sept 11 received yesterday. Re the legal agreement I understood some time ago this was being sent to you for signature. I take it that the gentlemen of this side have evidently trusted in your fair dealing, and have considered that the possession of your letters with offer of terms for the cash paid constitutes an agreement, at any rate I believe that is law here.

I submitted your letter to the gentlemen in the Syndicate and they assured me it would be attended to.

With due deference to your statement of liberal interpretation of your side of the bargain, I would like to point out, that since the conclusion of the bargain from my clients, they have received no further information re the working of your System, not even a complete list with retail selling prices of your manufacturers, or the name of firms in Australia which you stated previously, wished to adopt your System.

There must be many details which you could give my friends, to assist in placing the System, and which they would have seen by a personal visit but which can only be given by writing in detail or sending samples.

At present the business is at a standstill here, but I am just as anxious to see my friends get value for their outlay ????? that you should get your ??? of the bargain.
